Context

Following the period of norm development in the UN Group of Governmental Experts (GGE) and the establishment of the Open-ended Working Group (OEWG), international community has seen three different approaches to the discussion about norms and principles of responsible state behaviour in cyberspace: norms implementation, norms adaptation and contestation, and proposals for development of new norms. The purpose of this meeting is to take a critical look at each of these approaches and their relevance for strengthening the framework of responsible state behaviour and then contributing to prevent conflicts in cyberspace. We will focus on the localised norm implementation as possibly the most promising approach.

Regional approach is paramount in the UN processes of norm construction because global norm consolidation and sustainability depends on regional representativeness. However, the implementation of such approach routinely underdelivers in practice. During this working breakfast, we will discuss the conditions and dilemmas of the regional cyber approach to address the question: How to achieve a more localised form of cyber norms implementation that strengthens the global framework of responsible state behaviour, makes it more effective and inclusive?

While representation in global cyber debates has increased over the past years, this meeting aims to stimulate the discussion about concrete lessons, achievements and challenges for cyber norms localisation in different regional contexts. This includes the role of regional organisations and various non-state actors, for example transregional technical communities and subnational communal actors who confront cyber and digital challenges on the ground.
